We are delighted to inform you that the Club achieved a strong surplus of \$132,819 in 2022 (in comparison to \$133,563 in 2021), notwithstanding earning a lower income due to challenging conditions.

Much of the surplus was re-invested into upgrades and improvements such as the new roof, refrigeration systems, modern gaming machines, furniture and umbrellas.

Cash on hand of \$159,901 on 30 June 2022 was lower than \$199,955 for 30 June 2021 due to the COVID mandate, poor weather and the roof coming in over budget.
